

Glaston-BURY: Accessibility Statement

Background: Glaston-BURY is a one-day, not for profit music festival which takes place every August Bank Holiday in Bury town centre. Since it began in 2008, over £250,000 has been raised for **Bury Hospice** and other local causes.

Intentions: As a fundraising event, we want to be as inclusive as possible. This is a journey for us and that whilst it will not be possible for us to get things "right" for everyone straight away, we simply wish to ensure that whatever measures are within our reach will be put into place. We try to improve every year in what we can offer. Access is a wide topic and we realise that it is not limited only to the requirements of those with disabilities but to **anyone** who may have difficulty enjoying our event due to access needs.

Limitations:

- As an event operating in both indoor and outdoor venues which are spread across a town centre, there are
 various barriers to accessibility over which we have no control. These include things such as the cobbled
 street and stone pavements in the Peel Stage area and the fact that some venues are below ground and

- As we cannot find a provider of accessible viewing platforms who is able to both drop off and collect on a
 Bank Holiday, we are currently unable to offer this provision. We have no means by which to transport or
 store a platform until it can be collected nor the knowledge to safely assemble or disassemble one independently so for now, viewing platforms remain a goal for us.
- Our website is in the process of being changed to allow better presentation and facilities for those with access needs.

Current Accessibility Provision:

- Most indoor venues are fully accessible to wheelchairs or buggies and offer accessible bathroom facilities.
 Seating is available although this is first come, first served. Due to licensing regulations, some venues will not allow access to Young Carers after certain hours. Please check with the venues directly.
- As of 2019 we have made a designated Safe Area (adjacent to the First Aid area) available to anyone who
 feels vulnerable in any way. The Safe Area is on The Wylde and is staffed by Marshalls with experience in
 issues such as Disability, Hate Crime and Mental Health.
- One free essential companion ticket is offered for every paying disabled customer who is over the age of 16.
- Three of the five outdoor stages have level access for wheelchairs, buggies and most mobility aids
- A "quiet space" has been made available courtesy of our partners Bury Street Pastors for the benefit of
 those with Sensory Processing conditions and of course anyone who may need peace and quiet for any reason.
